It's hard to believe it is April already - and but for COVID-19, we would all be gathering for District Conference in SanDestin to celebrate another year of fellowship and making a difference in our communities and the world. That said, I'd like to focus on two important events - one calling us to action, the other to reflection.

As you have no doubt heard and can read below, on March 26, an EF4 Tornado came through the historic residential district of Newnan, Georgia - with winds reaching as high as 170 mph that caused catastrophic damage, .5 mile wide and 1.7 miles long. The storm damaged about 1800 homes - 300 of those were left uninhabitable. The city's low to moderate income residential area received major damage, as did two local schools.

- Not Hold Dual U.S. Citizenship.



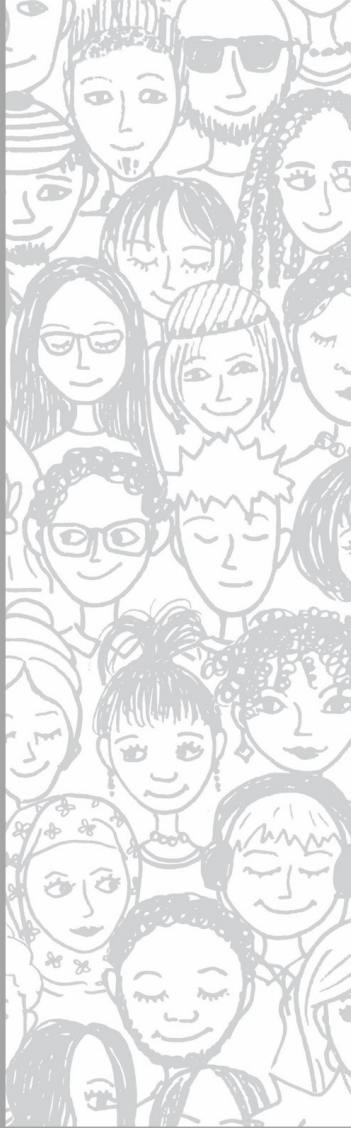
GRSP Update **New Direct College Selection Program**

Air Powered Grippers

Purpose

For independence and are unable to do daily living tasks, it can be very stressful. You don't have the same capability of moving your body sitting. Due to this, it's difficult for people in a wheelchair to bend their body, making the wheelchair to go again. One main reason as to why they are bending down is because they are on the ground. Since people drop items in their everyday life, bending down when you are in a wheelchair is putting a muscle especially when sitting. The purpose of why I created and tested two self-inflating air-powered grippers is to see the amount of air that is added into them. The grippers can carry a variety of grippers have a long tubing that can reach the floor and grip onto items that are sitting on the ground and not hurt.

Hypothesis

A four-finger gripper and a three-finger gripper, then the four-finger gripper will be the more capable of carrying the most weight. The four-finger gripper will be more effective if it has more fingers. The more fingers the gripper has, the more secure an item is.

Background Research

For anything air-powered, there needs to be a lot of research done to make the technology. If research isn't done that, you won't get much information that may need finding in constructing the robots, when it comes to making anything air-powered or being operated by air. I am also aware that writing too much air to something can cause it to overinflate or explode.

It is true, we don't know if a robot could work under all that pressure. One thing that the pressure from the air could be the material used for the robot. This could impact if the robot was made from a weak material, then the air pressure would make it collapse and it is stronger and bendable than the air pressure would not impact as much as the robot is.

It is a hard thing. Part of being disabled means you get around in a wheelchair. I am here to help when moving around or reaching down since they can't rely on their legs to get back up. I also know that when reaching down they can fall off their wheelchair and get back up. In other cases, sometimes they feel too much or overinflating that they
